Lynn Sage Symposium Travel Awards Program for Fellows and Residents

A primary purpose of Lurie Cancer Center's mission is to train the next generation of cancer specialists. To that end, the Lurie Cancer Center seeks funding from the Lynn Sage Cancer Research Foundation for the Lynn Sage Scholars Program. The program will invite medical, radiation, and surgical residents and fellows in hematology/oncology to apply for the program that takes place in conjunction with the **21st Annual Lynn Sage Breast Cancer Symposium**. The proposal provides support for 20 participants (5 local and 15 from outside of Chicago).



PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

The Lynn Sage Symposium Travel Awards is an opportunity for residents and fellows to learn the latest clinical and scientific advances in breast cancer research through their attendance at the symposium. It is an unrivaled opportunity to collaborate with peers and esteemed leaders in the breast cancer field and meet breast cancer experts from around the world.

In addition to attending the main symposium sessions, the awardees will participate in a special forum to discuss case studies contrasting the differences and similarities in the management of patients with various breast cancer disease states. In addition, physician speakers from both academic and private practice settings will present their experiences, recommendations, and guidance on the career paths available to residents and fellows.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

- Identify key issues to consider when deciding between oncology careers.
- Outline the differences and similarities of breast cancer research in academic medicine and private practice settings.
- Describe characteristics of a successful clinician in both academic medicine and private practice settings.

ELIGIBILITY

- A limited number of awardees will be accepted through a competitive online application process.
- A letter of support from the applicant's Program Director or Mentor is required.
- Residents and fellows from the U.S. and abroad are encouraged to apply.
- The awards will be limited to first-time program participants.
- Applicants must demonstrate an interest in the field of breast cancer (hematology/oncology, surgery, radiation, pathology, etc.).

FELLOWS AND RESIDENTS CAREER FORUM

All awardees attend the Residents and Fellows Forum, which provides them with the opportunity to learn about the career paths of early-career oncologists at the Lurie Cancer Center and obtain valuable advice to help guide the start of their respective careers. The early-career oncologists help awardees identify key issues to consider when deciding between oncology careers (e.g., academic medicine versus private practice). They share their experiences and lessons learned throughout their own career paths. When we request feedback from awardees after the symposium, they often cite the significant value of the Residents and Fellows Forum in helping them determine next steps for their careers.
